





We need more supply & more empty homes in expensive cities



- Prosperous cities have more expensive housing
- And fewer empty homes 0.1% in Crawley in 2019
- We need to tackle the housing shortage in Southern cities, and boost prosperity in Northern cities

Northern cities need more exports





 Urban economic theory distinguishes between "local services" (eg cafes) and "exporters" (eg manufacturers, software)

 Northern exporters are less productive than Southern exporters – this is the levelling up divide

Northern cities need demand for their exports




- Nottingham makes Warhammer figurines
- By selling them across the world and to other parts of the UK, these exports bring money into Nottingham
- Therefore more consumption elsewhere helps Nottingham's production

The housing crisis suppresses consumption in the South, and production in the North


Figure 1 – Housing costs' reduction in disposable incomes across geography, 2018



- Housing crisis suppresses disposable income and consumption in Southern cities. More homes would address this.
- Planning reform increases consumption and income after housing costs in the South.
- And increases production and incomes before housing costs in the North.

More homes in the South would also redistribute wealth

Figure 1: Average housing equity 2013 and growth to average equity 2013-18



- Current planning system causes mismatch between supply and demand
- Housing wealth builds up in affluent cities – and poorer areas lose out
- More housing in expensive cities would reduce this inequality

- Current planning system is highly discretionary
- We need a much more rules-based system where you can build if you follow the rules
- Would increase total supply and reconnect local demand to local supply – and advance levelling up
